Leo S. Nozick, 64 Passes In Edmonton

EDMONTON, (Special) — Leo S. Nozick, one of Edmonton's pioneer residents, passed away Nov. 3 at the age of 64.

Born in Russia, he came to Canada in 1905, settling in Edmonton. Mr. Nozick was a Pioneer Manufacturer's Representative in the Ladies' Wear Business and was in the wholesale ladies ready-to-wear business until his retirement in 1956. He was a board member of Beth Shalom synagogue; a member of the Edmonton Chevra Kadisha; a member of B'nai B'rith Lodge No. 732, and a past treasurer of the Edmonton Zionist Council. During the First World War, Mr. Nozick was a member of the Jewish Legion under General Trumpeldor in Palestine. Upon his return, he joined the Canadian Army where he also saw service.

Surviving are his wife, Evelyn; a son, Mandle, two grandchildren, all of Edmonotn; a brother, Jack, and a sister, Ellen Budd, of Winnipeg. Services were held at Beth Shalom synagogue with Rabbi Dr. L. L. Sacks officiating. Interment was in the Edmonton Jewish cemetery.
